Colorado Music Hall Of Fame Recognizes East High, Alums

The Paramount Theater was alive and rocking on the evening of November 28, 2017, and several East High star artists and East High School music programs were center stage. The event marked the fifth induction concert of the Colorado Music Hall of Fame.

This year the Hall featured the achievements of some of America's leading musicians and vocalists, most who called Denver their home. East alums inducted were Ron Miles (1981); Bill Frisell (1969); and Earth Wind and Fire members: Philip Bailey (1969), Andrew Woolfolk (1968) and Larry Dunn (1971). Non-East High alums inducted were Dianne Reeves and the legendary Charles Burrell Sr.

Every inductee paid tribute to their beginnings in Denver. They talked and sang about the value of community and family and the need for space and freedom to develop their musical craft. Denver provided those opportunities and all were quick to credit their success to such support.

The Committee singled out East High School for its long and storied history of excellence in music. Accepting the award for East were current instrumental teacher Keith Oxman and vocal teacher Will Taylor, both who are carrying on the legacy of music which started in the first East High building in 1874. Vocal music teacher Marion Padbury and instrumental music teacher Vincent Tagliavore were

also praised for their part in developing musical talent. This school award and the individual awards will be on display in the Colorado Music Hall of Fame museum at the Red Rocks Amphitheater.

The current East High Jazz Band started out the evening performing as the lead-in to the starstudded program to follow. Purnell Steen, class of 1959, led the popular Le Jazz Machine in several numbers. The jazz pianist was inducted into the East Alumni Heritage Hall in 2016.

The first inductee introduced was Charles Burrell, a classical and jazz performer who is most prominently known for being the first African American to play for a major American Symphony (San Francisco). He was often referred

to as the "Jackie Robinson of classical music. Now 97 years of age and in poor health, he managed to make a brief appearance where

he received a rousing ovation.

Second on the evening's program were Ron Miles and Bill Frisell who joined together to exhibit

their incredible talents. Ron is a leading jazz artist in Denver and teaches at Metro State University. Bill is a Grammy award-winning jazz guitarist. The two have collaborated several times in the past. Ron was inducted into the East Alumni Heritage Hall in 2010 and Bill in 2013.

Next up was Dianne Reeves, a Grammy winner. She created a song special for the occasion which recalled many of the wonderful memories of Denver in a more simple time. Diane graduated from George Washington High School in 1974.

Earth Wind and Fire brought the evening to a close with an explosion of musical talent that had the crowd on its feet, swaying and clapping to the music. Larry Dunn, artist and song writer, and Philip Bailey, singer and recording artist, led this American phenomenon known as Earth Wind and Fire. Philip was inducted into the East Alumni Heritage Hall in 2008 and

Larry in 2016. Back in the early days of the 1920s, jazz was flourishing in Five Points, sometimes known as the "Harlem of the West." It was great to see that such a legacy has been advanced by the careers of these former Angels.

East High Named Most Beautiful In Colorado

It never comes as a shock to find out that non-East community people also see East High School as a beautiful building. In the September 12, 2017, issue of Architectural Digest, East was selected as the most beautiful public high school building in Colorado.

Here is what the article had to say about this award: "For most students, summer has ended and schools across America are back in session. So what better time to take a closer look at the thousands of schools across the United States.


While many high school buildings might be rather bland from a design perspective, there are others that are veritable works of art we wouldn't blame you for mistaking them for universities, private homes or even castles, in some cases.

Representing a vast range of architectural styles from Gothic to Art Deco, these structures both historic and modern often represent the pride of a community Herein, we've selected the most beautiful public high school in each and every state.'

Designed by George H. Williamson (1893 graduate of "Old East") the new East building on the Esplanade opened for business in the Fall of 1925. Williamson chose the Jacobean style, a neoclassical form of architecture popular in the early 17th century. The most notable structure then erected in this style was the Old Hall at Oxford. That building inspired both Independence Hall in Philadelphia and East High in Denver. Williamson also designed Smiley Junior High School.

We are very fortunate that the school was built prior to the Great Depression. School architecture took on a more utilitarian style following the depression.

This dedicated 32 member team, once again, beat Cherry Creek's Grandview High School to win the State Championship. East will participate for the 28th time as State Champions. In the 31 year history of the program East has lost the State title only twice — 2002 and 2014.

The national competition is not in any way a "quiz bowl" type of competition. It is an oral questioning and discussion by demanding judges who are college professors,

Started in 1926, awards are based on specific qualifications, recommendations, written application, and an interview. Since 2011, and the creation of the East Angel Friends & Alumni Foundation (EAFAF), the scholarship program has been supported and funded by the Foundation. East alums also provide scholarships, a specific class in honor of a classmate, or as part of a reunion celebration.

In May 2017, the East Angel Friends & Alumni Foundation, the Thomas W. Bean Foundation, the Epstein-Smith family and alum James Reece (1960) generously provided scholarship dollars for 18 students totaling \$45,000.

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO . . .

The Lives Of **East Students Are Changed By WWI**

World War I changed the face of Denver East Side High School. This war, known as "The Great War" or "The War to Save Democracy," also changed the fabric of the American family and caused young people to give up their innocence.

America was only involved in the war from April 1917 until Armistice Day in November 1918. However, 116,708 Americans lost their lives on the battlefields where the age of technology ushered in new weapons for mass destruction: tank warfare, the machine gun and mustard gas.

In 1918, every student at East High School was given a newly published periodical titled "Study of the Great War." Even as early as elementary education in Denver patriotic and pro-war lessons were instituted in the schools. It clearly was national propaganda.

It was a time when East High students were trying to figure out their role in society and how they could be of service. Organizations such as the Boy Scouts and the Camp Fire Girls were influential in raising money for the war effort by encouraging people to buy Liberty Bonds and war stamps. The Red Cross Club was added to the extracurricular programs and ROTC took on a new interest.

With so many men off to war, American women left their expected singular role of homemaker to take up the labor void in the factories. For their patriotic participation in the war effort, women would soon realize a long held dream — the right to vote. But the American family was beginning to change.

Influenza: A Second War Front (1918 & 1919)

One of the tragic consequences of the war was the fast spreading plague of Influenza (Spanish Flu) believed to have been brought to America by returning veterans.

The war would affect the athletic program in the Denver schools

in 1918. The football teams would play only one game before the rest of the fall season was cancelled. Schools, churches and places of amusements were ordered closed. However, because people needed

to work, the street cars remained operational. Nearly a half million people in the United States died with Colorado suffering 3,783 deaths. Nearly 1,500 were citizens of Denver.

Peter Andreas, Class Of 1983

Peter Andreas, a graduate of East High School in 1983, has given the East High Museum a copy of his most recent book: Rebel Mother: My Childhood Chasing the Revolution (Simon & Schuster

He attended Lincoln Elementary and Baker Junior High before coming to East. Peter was active in the Angelaires, the East High Spotlight and the East Soccer team. Upon graduation Peter attended Swarthmore College where he graduated with a B.A. in Political Science. Later he earned M.A. and PhD degrees, both at Cornell College.

Currently he is a John Hay professor of International Studies at Brown University, where he holds a joint appointment between the Department of Political Science and the Watson Institute for International and Public Affairs. He has been an academy scholar at Harvard and a research fellow at the Brookings Institute. He has authored or co-authored 10 books and has written numerous articles for The New Republic, Harpers, The Nation and the Guardian, the Boston Globe, Washington Post and the New York Times.

His book: Smuggler Nation How Illicit Trade Made America (Simon & Schuster 2013) was on the best seller list for some time. His most recent

book: Killer High: A History of War In Six Drugs is currently under contract with Oxford Press.

Edwina Hume Fallis, Class Of 1895

The family of noted kindergarten Denver teacher Edwina Hume Fallis has donated items to the East High museum. Most notable is a copy of Edwina's book, "When Denver and I Were Young: A Teacher Textbook of A Child and Things."

Melissa Hart, Class Of 1987

Melissa Hart, class of 1987 was recently appointed to the Colorado Supreme Court. Before her appointment, she was a professor at the University of Colorado Law school. Her expertise is in Constitutional Law and she spearheaded the Byron White Center for the Study of American Constitutional Law.

While at East Melissa was active in competitive speech. She won the Wolcott medal for sight reading and was a member of the top 10 scholars at East. From East, Melissa moved on to Harvard where she earned

her undergraduate degree and her law degree. Upon graduation, Melissa clerked for United State Supreme Court Judge Paul Stevens and later worked as a trial lawyer for the Justice Department in Washington, D.C.

She has proved to be an strong advocate for equity in legal protection. Her focus was on ensuring that the poor and moderate income citizens could find legal services they could afford.

2017 Athletic Hall Of Fame Inductees Honored

The quaint and historic "old gym" at East was the scene of a large gathering assembled to pay honor to the recent induction of new members to the East High Athletic Hall of Fame.

On October 7, 2017, a total of 177 inductees, families and guests were in attendance as 15 former East athletes were inducted into the Hall along with recognition of two past state championship teams. Ten male athletes were honored as were five female athletes. This brings the total inductees to 236 members: 161 boys, 48 girls and 27 coaches.

Those male athletes honored this year were:

As an added feature, the committee invited former coaches to return and do the honors of presenting the inductee they coached. Those in attendance were: Larry Tarver, football; Tom Severtson,

A highlight of the evening was the honoring of two past state championship teams. Ad Lopez was the featured speaker as he introduced the 11 for-

mer teammates who were in attendance. East captured the 1962 state football title in an upset of favored Lakewood High School. This would mark the final state title for legendary coach Adolph "Pat" Panek.

Sheila MacDonald, captain of the 1983 state soccer championship team, introduced her 13 teammates and spoke about how special it was to be the first girls' athletic team in the history of Denver Public schools to win a state title.

George Haller, 1930-2017 • Class Of 1948

George Haller was born on November 16, 1930, and passed away on December 17, 2017. Born in Chicago, his family moved to Denver where George attended Park Hill Elementary School, Smiley Junior High School and East High School.

He graduated from the University of Colorado with degrees in Architectural Engineering and Business. He joined with his friend Dayl Larson and together they launched Haller and Larson Architects. Dayl also graduated from East in 1948.



George was an outstanding member of the Angel track team, competing in the hurdles and the sprints. He earned All-City and All-State

Philip Serafini, 1920-2017 • Class Of 1939

Philip Serafini graduated from East in 1939 and after World War II, he returned to Denver to teach, coach, and serve as an administrator at East High School. He died on April 10, 2017. He was born in Denver in 1920, (the youngest of 10 children) to Italian immigrants who came to Denver in

After graduating from East, Phil attended the University of Colorado, but his college career was

interrupted by World War II. He would become Phillip Serafini a trainer of pilots. His love of planes was sparked by a significant event. When he was 7, he attended a parade in downtown Denver and watched as Charles Lindbergh flew his "Spirit of St. Louis" over Denver during a celebratory tour of Lindbergh's crossing the Atlantic

Following the war, he enrolled at CU and eventually earned a degree in education. He turned down a high paying job as a private pilot for an oil company and chose to become an educator. In 1949 he joined the staff at East High School, where he taught science and social studies.

Phil would coach the East baseball team from 1951-1955 and in that time his teams would win two city championships and the first state title in baseball in 1951. The most notable player he coached was Stan Williams who would star in the majors for 19 years. Phil played on the East baseball team as a student. He also coached swimming.


He would serve out his career as an assistant principal at East and George Washington high schools and was principal at Swansea/Elyria Elementary and Cole Junior High School.

His family claims that his induction into the East High Coaches Hall of Fame in 2008 was his proudest moment.

Delbert Smith, 1949-2017 • Class Of 1967

Delbert was born in 1949 and passed away on December 18, 2017, following an automobile accident. He was a track star under the coaching of legendary Jack Moulton. He earned All-City and All-Metro honors in track. He also was an All-City football player and lettered in basketball as well. He would be among the last of the three-sport ath-

letes to attend East High School.

where he played basketball and ran track.

John Strobel, 1928-2017 • Class Of 1946

John was an outstanding multiple-sport athlete at East High School. He starred as the quarterback in coach Pat Panek's single-wing formation and was an outstanding baseball star. He was an All-City and All-State athlete and was recently inducted into the East High Athletic Hall of Fame. He was born in 1928 and passed away June 4,

John earned two letters in three sports: football, basketball and baseball. He was All-City

in all three sports and All-State in football and baseball. He led the Angels to the city football title in 1945 and led the DPS in batting in 1946.

After graduation, John attended the University of Colorado where he lettered all-four years in the Dal Ward coaching era. He played in the last CU vs DU football game. The game was played at Hilltop Stadium on the DU campus. Interestingly, that was the venue where he played his high school football games for East High.

John served in the United States Navy on a cruiser during the Korean War, rising to the level of lieutenant.

John was fiercely proud of his alma maters. He was on the CU athletic foundation and for years he organized gatherings at Lakewood Country Club for men who graduated from East in the 1940s and

Edward Divine White, 1924 -1917 • Class of 1942

Edward White literally left his mark on the city of Denver. The legendary architect was renowned for his work in the preservation of historic landmarks in Denver. His preservation projects included: Four Mile House, Central City Opera House, Molly Brown House, Boettcher Mansion, United States Post Office, Customs House, Lace House in Black Hawk, the tropical conservatory at the Botanic Gardens and the Carnegie Library in

He helped establish the Denver Landmark Preservation Commission in 1966 and served on the board for 27 years. In 2003 History Colorado honored him with the Stephen H. Hart award for his work in

While a student at East, Ed was an all-state swimmer. He graduated in 1942 and entered Columbia University but left to join the Navy where he served in Naval Intelligence. He returned to Columbia and graduated Phi Beta Kappa in 1948. He would return to Columbia to earn an advanced degree in architecture.

At the age of 19, Dick Anderson started working at O'Brien's Tonsorial Parlor at 4324 8th Avenue. In 1992 he bought the business from the family of Dick O'Brien. Sixtyone years of cutting "Angel" hair will come to a close.

"I have fond memories of the many young men from East High and South High. Many of them continued coming long after their high school graduation. I like to think my store was part of the East High family."

"In the 1950s crew cuts were the rage and I specialized in flat tops. One of my prize achievements was cutting the hair of Bob Linnen-

berger (Class of 1955). He had the perfect head shape for a flat top. You

could land a plane on that runway.' Dick's business has fallen victim to changing times. High priced real estate has forced out the small businessman. "I enjoyed talking with the young East men. We had great conversations and I kept up with many of their adult careers. This is the part I will miss the most."
